FROM THE REV. CHRIS MURPHY

Recently I was interviewed by the Newberg Graphic about my first few months as the pastor of our church. It was nice to share that I am having a great experience with our church as my family deepens our relationship with this community. I used the opportunity to share some of my dreams for Newberg First Presbyterian.

I highlighted that we are a church growing young as we empower children, youth, and young adults. I mentioned as part of growing young we are starting a college and young adult ministry this fall. The leaders of this ministry will be myself, my wife Karen, and our young adult leaders: Andrew Davis, Jack Reamy, and Ilsa Teppo. The exact structure and vision for this ministry will develop organically, but our first leaders meeting with be in August and our kickoff will be in September.

I shared as well that the beauty of our church is our heart of inclusion. We welcome everyone and we are inclusive of all people. We want people who feel marginalized in our society to feel accepted in our church.

I shared that we have a passion in our church for deep spirituality centered on personal relationship with Jesus and that we have a huge heart for mission. I am happy that at the end of July we celebrated our love for mission by having our mission partners Telile Fikru Badecha preach and sing on July 22nd and Brian and Julie O'Herin as our guest preachers on July 29th.

Our heart for deep spirituality is especially seen currently in our new prayer group that meets the first Sunday of every month. This group has grown to close to 15 people and we are always open for new members. We are learning different forms of prayer and exploring what it means for our church to be a House of Prayer.

Lastly, I will say that my heart for our church is summarized in the following statement. Newberg First Presbyterian Church is a Christ centered community growing in love with God, one another, and the world through the power of the Holy Spirit. My prayer is that people who join our community will be well loved. Martin Luther King Jr. spoke of the Beloved Community. King's vision for society was a beloved community of love, peace, justice, and reconciliation. May our church be a beloved community that glorifies Jesus in all that we do together.

Murphy helping First Presbyterian 'grow younger' (Article from Graphic)

Following long transition period, new pastor Chris Murphy bringing stability and a vision for the future

In recent years, longtime Newberg First Presbyterian Church member Chuck Zickefoose has liked to joke that a more fitting name would be First Presbyterian Church AARP. But coming out of a long transition following the retirement of pastor Peter Blank that included three interim pastors, Zickefoose said he believes new pastor Chris Murphy is already well on his way to making that quip about the church a thing of the past.

"I feel he's doing an excellent job," Zickefoose said. "He has a very good attitude toward the things we've had to face without a pastor. We're very pleased with how it's working."

Murphy, who started Feb. 1, had relatively limited pastoral experience in a church setting, but otherwise checked off all of the boxes the congregation was looking for in its next leader. Most importantly, he demonstrated he had a vision for helping the church "grow younger."

"It's an older congregation and it wants to have a future," Murphy said. "My background is in college and grad school ministry, so one of the things I brought to the interview is a goal to partner with George Fox University in helping start a college and young adult ministry." After graduating from Whitworth University in 1994, Murphy worked as a campus minister at Seattle-Pacific University and began pursuing a master's degree in divinity at Fuller Theological Seminary's satellite campus in Seattle.

Murphy later moved to Pasadena, Calif., to pursue his graduate work full-time at Fuller's primary campus, which is where he met his wife Karen.

After graduating, Murphy was hired by Fuller's Presbyterian ministries department while his wife pursued her doctorate in historical theology. Murphy stayed on for 13 years, serving as a minister to undergraduate and grad students, teachers and administrators en route to becoming director of the department.

Along with daughters Cate and Chiara, the couple moved to Oregon in 2015 to be closer to Chris' parents, who retired in Newberg. For two and a half years, he served as associate pastor for youth and young adults at Westminister Presbyterian Church in Portland.

"I love campus ministry and grad school ministry, but also have a heart for the church, so working at Westminister was great experience," Murphy said. "There is a team of four pastors and I was kind of learning the ropes and got an opportunity to preach. It's a fairly large church, so it was a great experience and it definitely confirmed my heart to be a lead pastor."

Partnering with George Fox to launch a student ministry at First Presbyterian in September is just one of the ways Murphy has been making over the church, much of it informed by the Fuller-produced book "Growing Young."

The book's main message is that the church needs to focus on empowering young people, so Murphy has been working on several fronts to do so. That includes launching a children's ministry, which is being led by Karen Murphy, and eventually growing a youth ministry from its foundations.

He has also updated First Presbyterian's worship style, blending some of its more traditional aspects with modern music and worship practices to create a more informal and relaxed environment that is welcoming to young families.

"My wife and I both do more modern worship music," Chris Murphy said. "She plays piano, I play guitar and little Chiara dances, so it's kind of fun. She's part of the Chehalem Dance Academy, too, but she just loves to go up front and dance during our worship songs." He has also crafted a new mission statement for the church and is working on a motto for the congregation to follow: BeLoved. The motto is meant to convey both the meaning of the phrase as one word, as in Martin Luther King Jr.'s idea for the "beloved community," and two, in that everyone who comes can expect to be loved.

"One of the things that I'm passionate about with our church is that we can be a place that welcomes everyone and is inclusive of all people," Murphy said.

With fall and a new "church year" just around the corner, Chris Murphy has a lot on his plate, but based on how his first six months have gone, he said he's hopeful about First Presbyterian's future, both in the short and long term.

"I think we've had a good response. People have been very gracious and kind to me," he said. "Now that I've come as a more permanent long-term pastor again, people are grateful to have someone and I think they are resonating with my heart and the direction that we want to take the church."

Featured Partners

The month July has been a unique time for our congregation in that we will have had Telile (Light of Hope) and Brian and Julie O'Herin (SIL -Wycliffe) as guest speakers on consecutive Sundays. We support both Light of Hope and SLI on a monthly basis and have heard firsthand how our contributions support their ministries. Salient features of each of these ministries include:

Light of Hope is under the umbrella of Frontier Fellowship and has as a major focus, ministry to the Arissi Oromo people both in Ethiopia and the U.S. Telile and Urgessa, her husband are a team ministering to Arissi Oromo communities in the U.S. and facilitating the building and staffing of schools in Ethiopia. They are also in the process of constructing a post high school educational facility to serve those that graduate from their schools. Telile is also an accomplished musician having produced DVDs with a back-up choir based in Shashamene, Ethiopia.

SIL - **Wycliffe** emphasizes Biblical translations and Brian's role in the past has been as an International Linguistics Coordinator. According to their website: "SIL is founded on the principle that communities should be able to pursue their social, cultural, political, economic and spiritual goals without sacrificing their ethnolinguistic identity. As a faith-based nonprofit organization, SIL works alongside language communities as they discover how to harness the power of their language to address challenges and reach their goals." Julie is active in their home church and supports Brian in his endeavors.

SUMMARY OF INCOME AND EXPENSE THRU JULY 2018

Greetings! Below is a snapshot of year to date income and expense in broad groupings. Through the end of July, we have completed 58% of the year. As you can see, we are on track with our budget, with both income and expense still tracking slightly higher than expected.
