NEWS FROM THOSE WE SUPPORT

Telile (Light of Hope) - Telile reports: "Our translation team is working on a Bible version translated into Arsi Oromo with the Bible consultant from Wycliffe Ethiopia. He comes twice a month or every other week and spends 5 days at a time with the team. Every time he comes they were able to finish a book or two depending on the size of the book. They have already completed 11 of the 39 books and 28 books to go. Our plan is to complete the edition by the end of 2018 and make it ready for publishing in 2019 or sooner." We are also continuing our collection of funds to purchase desks for a Light of Hope school. Our goal is 40 desks, equaling a goal of \$3200.

Brian and Julie O'Herin (SLI - Wycliffe) - My next overseas trip will be in April and May next year, Lord willing. There is an SIL linguistics gathering in Georgia, and from there I plan to go to Russia to meet with the translation team. We hope to do a final consultant check on Ruth, Jonah and Esther (after which they can go to publication), as well as collectively do some long term planning. I will likely be stopping briefly in Germany and the UK on my way home to meet with various people.

Dennis Smith (South America) - It was a privilege to have Dennis and Meribel visit us last month. We are fortunate that Dennis' parents live on the Oregon Coast which allowed us to have Ben, their son with them as well. They spent the last 3 months of 2017 visiting churches across the nation. Their ministry reaches the entire continent of South America and they have a number of partners from different denominations to assist them.

The Yorks (Cru - Athletes in Action) - One aspect of leadership development we oversee is the theological development of our staff to give them a strong biblical foundation and framework for lifelong fruitful ministry. Maureen is stepping into the role as theological coordinator as part of her job description. Eric is involved in aministrative activities for both Cru and AIA, and they will eventually be based in Ohio.

John & Gwenda (IMCK - Congo) - IMCK PAX Clinic in Kananga and also working for IMA World Health. The renovation final stage,the Women's Center, was under construction, when intense conflict broke out in the Kasai province during the past year. Renovation stopped for some months, but the construction staff kept the area guarded and swept clean. Work resumed recently.

> The Experience of Lent By Karen Murphy, Ph.D.

What is Lent?

Lent (meaning "springtime") is a period of 40 days (excluding Sundays) prior to Easter which the early church set aside as a time of preparation. It is a time of preparation of one's heart, mind, and soul, which allows one to fully embrace, experience, and live into the depth of the Paschal mystery that is presented to us in Christ's death and resurrection. It is a time in which we are called, in continuity with other Christians throughout the ages, to pray, repent, fast, listen, refocus, and remember.

During this season, we pray for grace, grace to see ourselves as we truly are. We pray for strength, strength not only to see our desperate, limited, and often desolate humanness, but also for the strength to see God as He truly is, with arms open wide, waiting to refresh us with hope, compassion, and peace. We pray that the Spirit of the living God will empower us in fresh, new ways as we seek to serve, to learn, to live, and to love. We repent of the times that we have fallen short, of the moments when we have not been kind, when we have not lived justly, when we have been selfish and fearful, when we were not present to the people around us.

During this season, we choose to fast, sacrificing our own desires, wants, and needs, in order that we may be re-sensitized to the needs of the world around us, to the cries for love and the cries for justice. We set aside our own incessant cravings that we may hear the ever-present still, small voice of God speaking to us in the midst of a world filled with noise, with busyness, with "doing," with mindlessness. We fast in order that we may hear again, that we may recognize our own longings for life, for healing, for love, that we may live mindfully in the present, truly seeing one another as sons and daughters of God.

LENT CONTINUES

And, finally, during this season we remember. We remember that we are but dust, that we were created from dust and to dust we shall return. We remember that we were bought with a price, that we are not our own, and that we are deeply, deeply loved in the midst of our brokenness, in the midst of our shortcomings, in the midst of our failings, and in the midst of our weakness. We are reminded that God is ever present, never changing and that we are forever held by His great mercy. Lent is a time of prayer, repentance, fasting, remembering, and celebrating what and whose we are. During this Lenten season, may you experience God's gracious and loving presence as you wait in expectation for the day when, by His Spirit, all is made new.

Lectio Divina:

Mark 1: 9-13 "At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. As Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased." At once the Spirit sent him out into the desert, and he was in the desert forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him."

Read the passage slowly three times and respond to the following questions.

What word or phrase stands out to you?

During this season of Lent, what do you feel called to fast from in your life in order to refocus your attention on God?

What spiritual practice(s) would you like to add into your life?

What aspects of your life feel like a "desert" experience? How do you need God to meet you?

2018 Budget Report

The 2018 budget is preliminary at this point and will be finalized at the February Session meeting. So far, the pledges received total \$101,682. We have budgeted for \$115,000 in pledges and \$165,360 in total income including non- pledged giving and reserves. In 2017 \$125,000 was budgeted and \$129,476 was received from those who pledged. We recognize that we have lost some members in the last 2 years, but still have many generous people in our church family.

This year \$202,858 is budgeted for expenses compared to \$194,120 last year. The increase represents an increase in costs, even though our mortgage payments, our Presbyterian Mission pledge and our per capita expense will all be less. And there will be no automatic 2% pay increases. This leaves a shortfall between budgeted income and expenses of \$37,498.

We are excited about starting off in February with a new pastor and with renewed enthusiasm. We are hopeful that there will be increased participation in the church and in giving. And we are very grateful to all who have pledged.

Finance Committee

Henderson House, McMinnville, Oregon

2017 has given the clients and staff at Henderson House so much to be thankful about. This year we replaced the shelter with a new confidential location. We have maintained strong relationships with community partners and active engaged volunteers. We've been able to offer a new domestic violence support group in Newberg and started a "Girl's Circle" program that addresses self-esteem and violence prevention. We are also thankful for bilingual staff and volunteers that make it possible to work with families throughout Yamhill County.

We are most thankful for the opportunity to work with clients like Sue! Sue and her children called our 24-hour hotline seeking help with an abusive relationship. She recognized that she and her children were in danger but didn't know how to proceed toward safety. After that phone call, Henderson House staff were able to relocate them into our confidential shelter, connect her with community resources that would lead her to self-sufficiency, and with time, into her own home. Through ongoing support with Henderson House staff and support groups, she and her children, journey to a new, safer life.
