



Our Response to Immígrant Asylum Seekers

FROM THE REV. CHRIS MURPHY

I hope all of you are having a good beginning to your summer. Recently, I preached a sermon entitled, "Seeing Clearly", in which I explored the importance of having our eyes opened to the injustice of the treatment of immigrant families coming to the United States seeking asylum. Social activists remind us that there are always injustices to fight and the harmful treatment of immigrants is nothing new in this country. This is accurate, but I also feel this is a unique time in our nation's history in which the Church must come together with people of all faiths and those who do not identify with a particular faith and stand up to our national leaders who are advocating for a zero-tolerance policy towards immigrant families.

Despite what our current president and attorney general suggest, asylum seekers are not criminals and it is inhumane to lock up people in cages while a process happens to consider whether they can legally stay in our country. Christians must stand with the oppressed and stand against our current president's immigration policies. This is not an issue of which party you belong to, it is an issue of what is moral and just and we need to see clearly in this critical time in our nation.

In this Pew News, you will see photos of some recent prayer vigils being held outside of the Federal Correctional Institution in Sheridan, Oregon. I have joined a group of clergy from many faiths to demand that the 123 asylum seekers in this facility receive proper spiritual care and legal representation. You will see in this issue also a letter that was sent to some of our local political leaders requesting action. I am happy to share that 25 individuals from our congregation signed this letter.

Friends, if we still need clarity on what to believe is proper action even after hearing about the unlawful separation of 2300 children from their families, may I remind us that Jesus was a refugee and an immigrant and would have been killed as a child if he was refused access into Egypt when Herod was seeking his life. If the Savior of the world can relate to these families and if many of us have ancestors who fled to this country because of persecution, then now is the time to stand together to support the asylum seekers coming to our country.

Dear Oregon Representatives Ron Wyden, Jeff Merkley, and Earl Blumenauer,

The members of the congregation at First Presbyterian Church of Newberg, Oregon wish to add our voices in protest of the treatment of the 123 men who are being detained at the Federal Correctional Institution in Sheridan, Oregon. We understand that these men have not received proper legal representation or spiritual care from clergy. We also understand that many of these men are seeking asylum due to dangerous conditions in their home countries. Seeking asylum is not a criminal action and therefore it is unlawful for them to be detained in this way.

Although President Donald Trump has provided an executive order to keep families together, we believe it is unlawful to detain whole families together in inhumane conditions and for long periods of time. Again, many of the immigrants who are entering the United States are seeking asylum and therefore are not criminals and should not be treated inhumanely.

We ask for an end to the zero-tolerance policy of President Donald Trump's administration and that the more than 2300 children who have been separated from their families be reunited with them. We ask that those seeking asylum in this country receive fair treatment and not be placed in detention centers.

This inhumane treatment of individuals and families must stop. As a Christian congregation, we follow the Biblical mandate to welcome the stranger and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Please act now to stop this human rights violation!

Telile (Light of Hope) - Telile reports this from her Bible study: What's more exciting than to see a Muslim background believer who's been following Christ secretly for over two years finally gain the confidence to tell her family she believes in Jesus?

That's my friend's story. She was born and raised in a Muslim family. When she joined our Bible study group in Portland, Oregon, two years ago, she told us she was following Jesus and wanted to learn more from scripture about Him. However, she kept her faith secret. She finally told her family that she's a believer in Christ. When family members question her faith, Nuriya responds, "I'm still learning about my new faith and may not be able to answer every difficult question you ask me about Jesus. But Jesus is real. Following Him is working for me. You too need to know Him."

Brian and Julie O'Herin (SIL - Wycliffe) -Brian reports that on his recent European trip; " The entire translation team met, and the books Ruth and Jonah were checked and approved for publication by the translation consultants. Not only was this task completed, but we all learned a lot about the process, and we built and strengthened relationships within the translation team."

Dennis Smith (South America) -Dennis reflects on an ecumenical workshop : Reformed faith in Chile, is a tradition that goes back to the 1860s. For this group, fruits of the Gospel in Chile have included the Presbyterian emphasis on education and on reaching decisions through a participative and democratic process. They told of frequent fundraisers — how many empanadas and cakes must one sell to build a classroom? They showed the visitors how they were expanding their worship space and building a Sunday School wing, cement block by cement block, with their own hands.

The Yorks (Cru - Athletes in Action) Eric reports: During our staff conference we had a chance to give input to our Core Training working group. CT is the two year curriculum and practical skills for new staff and interns. We're excited to be using training unified with the Cru campus ministry across all of our divisions.

John & Gwenda Fletcher (IMCK - Congo) - Little known fact: Gwenda, an education consultant, assists the Presbyterian Community of Congo (CPC) Education Department in its efforts to enhance the quality of education in the church's 702 elementary and secondary schools and in building connections between the Congo Mission Network and CPC's educational work. The Fletchers and their Congolese colleagues work to help the people of Congo experience the abundant life Jesus promises.
