NEWS FROM THOSE WE SUPPORT

Telile (Light of Hope) - Telile reports: The political situation in Ethiopia: We don't see mass protests. People are keeping silent at gunpoint as they lose their loved ones. Ask God for justice with peace, especially for those who are suffering at the hand of the very government that is supposed to protect them. Pray for the Light of Hope staff serving in the midst of ongoing unrest.

[As a side note: It was announced very recently that the Ethiopian prime minister resigned and the country is again under a state of emergency. During the last one, many people were detained and rioting broke out. It is not known how this will develop until new leadership is determined.]

Brian and Julie O'Herin (SIL - Wycliffe) - The big news is that I [Brian] have decided to step down from my role as International Linguistics Coordinator at the end of September and return to full-time translation work in the project we've been working in, off and on, for the last 30 years. More news about this later.

Dennis Smith (South America) - About Dennis and Meribel - Dennis was an honor graduate in speech communications at Wheaton College in Illinois, and subsequently completed a one-year graduate fellowship at the National College of Education in Evanston, Illinois. The following year, his new home church, First Presbyterian in Evanston, sponsored him on a one-year volunteer assignment as a communication consultant to the National Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Guatemala. Maribel was educated in Guatemala and received training as a bilingual secretary at the National Secretarial School in Guatemala. In 2004, Maribel began to be mentored in holistic therapies designed to help people manage stress and seek wholeness by Karen Woehler, a PC(USA) commissioned lay pastor and retired nurse from Minnesota.

The Yorks (Cru - Athletes in Action) - Maureen writes: We're keeping a thankful heart while Erik maintains a robust travel schedule. While the girls miss him a lot, we try to focus on what he gets to do and that we get to stay here through the school year with family and friends. We're developing a vision and bucket list with the girls of things we will see, visit and learn on our way to and when we get to Ohio.

John & Gwenda (IMCK - Congo) - The Kasai Christian Medical Institute ("IMCK" according to its French acronym) was established 58 years ago in the (then) Belgian Congo. It has continued operating through wars and political insecurity and has been ranked among the top such institutions in the DRC, but struggles to meet basic payroll and medical supply needs.

If you would like to extend the love and fellowship of Christ by helping welcome new members consider joining in one of the following ways: bake small loaves of bread (labeled to avoid allergy challenges), volunteer to pull loaves from the freezer when you see new faces in Church (there are more every week!), help distribute the bags after church and invite guests to walk over to the Fellowship Hall to meet others, or simply sit with someone new so they can feel the love of Christ that flows over coffee and whatever other goodies are shared.

Well, Jesus fed 5000 people with five loaves of bread and two fish! We should be challenged to need to feed so many. Right now, we give out a few loaves each week and these little loaves have become a way to connect with new faces in our Church. A little loaf of bread, some information about our church family and an invitation to return the following week. Who knows where our Friendship Loaves might lead us?
