

It is interesting...When we ask the question: Why did people in the Roman Empire embrace Christianity?

We discover it wasn't because they simply heard the message of Jesus and believed.

That did happen... but often what first attracted them was not the "religion" per se but the lives those who followed Jesus.

It other words it was the 3rd 4th 5th and 6th revolutions that caught their attention. Then the 1st and second made sense.

for every person, including the elderly, the very young, women, the infirm and "slaves"

A Revolution in the Home: The New Idea of Family Not simply the man and his property

A Revolution of Community: Love Your Neighbor **No matter who they are** 

A Revolution of Work: How Labor Became Holy

physical labor

**Apologist** 

These Christians walk in humility and kindness, and falsehood is not found among them. They love one another. They despise not the widow. They grieve not the orphan. He that has distributes liberally to him that has not. If they see a stranger they bring him under their roof and they rejoice over him as if they were their own brother and if there is a man that is poor and needy and they have not an abundance of necessities they fast two or three days that they may supply the needy with their necessary food.

ARISTIDES (2nd Century Roman historian.)

The earnestness with which the people of this religion help one another in their needs is incredible. They spare themselves nothing for this end. Their first lawgiver put it into their heads that they were all brethren.

LUCIAN (2nd Century Roman Satirist)

Perhaps the most courageous evidence of Christian faith witness of the Martyrs


By 325, an estimated 7 million were Christians with as many as 2 million killed for the faith.

Accused of "atheism" and "treason" for not worshiping the Roman Gods; and sometimes of cannibalism for eating flesh and drinking blood in their Communion services.

There were some who resisted these destructive patterns Roman religion but they were clearly in the minority.

## **Christianity**

One God... "three forms" Creator, Savior, Advocate working together

The story of the Hebrew People and Jesus

From chaos, to order, to justice to love

chaos to order— the Jews move into the "promised land" order to justice— the 10 Commandments

justice to LOVE —Jesus, the Messiah, comes to save God's people...and the world

...but not with the "power" they were expecting (like that the Roman Gods)...but with the power of **forgiveness** 

Father **forgive** them they know not what they do

The power of forgiveness fulfills the promise in Jeremiah 31:33, 34

I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts... I will **forgive** their wickedness and will remember their sins no more... Once forgiven... a whole new life is possible...

a peace that passes understanding Phil 4:7 a love that transcends knowledge Eph 3:19

a fourth form of love...
eros, philia, storge, AGAPE
...loving even your enemies
