"The Season of Advent"

FROM THE REV. CHRIS MURPHY-

Welcome to the season of Advent! Advent is the liturgical season where we prepare for the coming of the birth of Jesus. The word Advent is from the Latin word adventus, which means "coming." It is a translation of the Greek word parousia. At one point in church history the focus of Advent was on the second coming of Christ, but since the middle ages the Church has connected Advent primarily to the birth of Jesus. Today, Advent refers to the period from Dec. 1st through Dec. 24th, Christmas Eve. The season directly after Advent is Christmastide, which lasts for 12 days until Epiphany Sunday.

You will notice that during the Sundays of Advent, we are enjoying the stories within Matthew and Luke that highlight the birth of Jesus and the events that were occurring before and after the birth. We are reading some Scriptures from the Old Testament that prophesy the coming of Emmanuel, God with us. We are also singing Christmas music, so that we can immerse ourselves in the wonder of Christ's birth.

I hope in this season of Advent that you can find comfort and joy is the coming of the baby Jesus. We can be reminded that God became a vulnerable baby, so that we could see the invisible God become visible (Colossians 1: 15). The beauty of this season is that we can come to God and share our vulnerability, while being in awe of God's vulnerability.

There is nothing like holding a vulnerable infant in one's arms. Babies are completely dependent on adults for everything. It is profound that God chose to become vulnerable because it shows that we follow a God who is not afraid of entering our human experience. God is not at all distant or aloof from the needs of humanity or the rest of God's creation. God became one of us and remains with us in our seasons of joy and hardship.

I know that during the joy of the season of Advent and Christmas many people also experience waves of grief as they remember loved ones who have passed away. As you experience different emotions this Advent season, remember Jesus has entered our experience and understands our feelings. Just as a vulnerable baby commands our attention, may we hold this season with awe and wonder and allow all our feelings to be brought to our loving God, who offers us comfort.

Deacons are grateful for all who have contributed to the Deacons Fund. As we look back on 2019 we would like to remind you of how our finances were used. First of all we pledge quarterly payments totaling \$4,300 a year to the following organizations:

FAITH IN ACTION – Faith in Action brings people of faith together to advance racial and economic justice.

FRIENDSVIEW RETIREMENT COMMUNITY – a Christian Life Plan Community.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY, NEWBERG – a nonprofit organization that helps families build and improve places to call home.

HENDERSON HOUSE of McMinnville – provides Yamhill Co. with services for victims dealing with domestic and sexual violence.

LOVE, INC. – mobilizes local churches to transform lives and community in the Name of Christ. Assistance programs such as food, clothes, dental care, and other basic needs. Our church helps with the bike program.

LUTHERAN COMMUNITY SERVICES, McMinnville – provides programs for families, immigration counseling and advocacy programs.

A FAMILY PLACE – works to reduce child abuse, neglect and foster placements in Yamhill County by offering at-risk families parent education and specialized preschool for children.

NEWBERG FISH – member of the Oregon Food Network focused on providing emergency food services.

PROVIDENCE MEDICAL CENTER – for providing spiritual care and hospice services.

YCAP (Yamhill Community Action Partnership) – operates a Coordinated Entry point for Yamhill County for housing and services for those in need.

We have a Good Samaritan Program to help anyone in our Congregation that needs some financial help.

We sponsored tables for the Hearts of Gold dinner at Providence Medical Center and Love, Inc. annual banquet for a total of \$1,000. We support our teachers in the Congregation \$500. The Presbyterian Coffee Project is a mission outreach program at First Presbyterian that is in its eighteenth years of existence. The Project partners with Equal Exchange, a democratically organized worker-owned cooperative located in Massachusetts. EE product line includes many choices in coffee, chocolate and tea plus other household staples and healthy snacks.

Equal Exchange's model of trade is called **Fair Trade.** It is built upon an equitable and strong relationships between farmers and consumers. By buying EE products we join a network that enables small-lot farmers to stay on their land, support their families, plan for the future, and care for the environment.

For this Christmas holiday season EE Christmas gift boxes and cases of individual products are available for purchase. After service **Sunday**, **December 8** in the Fellowship Hall there will be a display of products and orders will be taken. All are invited to stop by and take a "look". Orders will be filled and ready for pick-up on Sunday, December 22.

November Session Minutes Summary

Capital Campaign: approximately \$128k received in pledges, and \$29k actual monies received, so far.

Financials: expenses continue to exceed income. Undesignated funds balance currently at -\$49k.

Facilities: since installing security lights/camera system, no new graffiti has been detected. Many thanks to Tim Weaver and Gary Buck for working on this.

Mission: the committee will be promoting purchasing gifts for Christmas through such catalogs as Heifer International, Presbyterian Mission Giving and Compassion International.

The Session accepted, with regret, the resignation of Susan King, Office Manager.

Deacons: the auction raised approximately \$4,100. A great success.

A presentation of Christmas Around the World will be presented December 15, during worship. The program will consist of narration, slides and music to highlight how our fellow Christians celebrate the season around the world.

Presbytery Meeting

The Presbytery of the Cascades recently met at Southminster, Beaverton on Nov. 15-16, with approximately 150 in attendance. FPC Newberg was represented by Pastor Murphy, Elise Prayzich and Sylvia Stater, commissioned Ruling Elders, and Gary Buck also attended the Saturday gathering.

Three lots were approved for sale – one by FPC Salem, with proceeds to be used for repairs/facility improvement. Two lots in Oakland, OR were also approved for sale.

Presbytery coffers have ballooned in recent years, due to dissolution of some congregations. The 2020 Budget for Presbytery was approved, with Per Capita amount set at \$36.50 per congregant.

Commissioners were elected to attend the 224th General Assembly: 2 pastors (plus alternate), and 2 ruling elders.

Approval of Rachel Stramel, candidate for ordination, after examination by those in attendance. Ms. Stramel will be ordained as Associate Pastor at Orenco Presbyterian Church, Hillsboro, on December 15.

Approval of motion that, at each meeting, Presbytery will acknowledge the land upon which Presbytery meets, and the people to whom the land once belonged. Sessions are encouraged to do the same.

Overture to GA: an overture to the 2020 General Assembly passed, "Responding to the Human Needs of those affected by the Crisis in Syria". Read the whole overture at Presbytery website.

Finally, a motion was made and passed, that pastors will be entitled to a fully-paid 3-month sabbatical after 6 years of service to a particular congregation.
