Maybe younger generations and governments with an increasing number of female leaders will have less violent solutions. Maybe we can learn to work across the aisle and find peaceful solutions. I think we are one good success story away from a movement of peace in our world.
- **4. I hope we can learn to love the earth**. The recent Climate Strikes led by youth around world have reminded all of us that our earth is a finite resource. We cannot continue to abuse the planet and expect the future generations to live with enough food, clean air, and clean water. Science reminds us that to care for creation is to sustain future generations. How about we move to earth sensitive solutions for energy and other significant changes to the way we care for the planet?
- 5. I hope we see and love those closest to us first. I believe Jesus teaches us to love God and one another. Featured Mission Partner

Taliilee – Light of Hope Ministry

Taliilee sent this information over the holidays, she and her husband Urgessa facilitate the Light of Hope Ministry in southeastern Ethiopia and around the U.S. The work is among the Arsi Oromo peoples involving the following endeavors:

Arsi Oromo Bible: After ten years of hard work, the translation of Arsi Oromo Bible is complete. The manuscript was sent to South Korea for typesetting and publication. How exciting for Arsi Oromos to have access to God's Word in the language that directly speaks to their heart. Praise God! We want to print 5000 copies and your gift of \$10 provides a Bible.

New Schools: Three elementary schools in two districts are being constructed. Access to formal education is going to be available to these communities for the first time. More than 200 students in each school will have access to formal education in the first year. Not only will there be children learning to read and write and opening new possibilities for their futures, entire communities will be learning about God's love through Jesus as we address their need for education.

New Faith Communities: Many churches among the Arsi people are filled with young people. And many of them don't have pastors. We thank God for our Bible translation team who go to those rural churches and distribute the Arsi Oromo written and audio Bible, as well as preach and teach. In my (Taliilee) two trips to Ethiopia, I had opportunities to teach about contextualities of worship with evangelists, choir, and worship leaders. The training inspired them to create gospel songs in their cultural melodies.

Diaspora Oromo Community: God has given me a unique opportunity to mobilize Ethiopian Oromo churches to participate in God's mission in their neighborhood and beyond. I will be spending my holidays singing and preaching at Oromo churches in Portland and Minnesota.

A Note of Grateful Thanks!



Session Notes:


