Embracing the Humanity of Jesus During Easter

My wife Karen and I have a tradition of watching the movie <u>Chocolat</u> every year during Lent in preparation for Easter. The movie tells the story of a single mom and daughter who enter an old European town and set up a chocolate shop during the season of Lent. The mayor of the town is a devout religious person and is not happy with the presence of this secular woman who is tempting the town to enjoy chocolate during the Lenten season of abstinence. As the movie unfolds, you realize it is a beautiful story of grace. I encourage you to watch it during Holy week and see what I mean. In one of the final scenes of the movie the very young and inexperienced local priest gets up to preach his homily on Easter morning.

Here is how the sermon starts...

"I'm not sure what the theme of my homily today ought to be. Do I want to speak of the miracle of Our Lord's divine transformation? Not really, no. I don't want to talk about His divinity. I'd rather talk about His humanity. I mean, you know, how He lived His life, here on Earth. His kindness, His tolerance... Listen, here's what I think. I think that we can't go around measuring our goodness by what we don't do. By what we deny ourselves, what we resist, and who we exclude. I think... we've got to measure goodness by what we embrace, what we create, and who we include."

I love this sermon and it means more to me now that I am a local pastor serving a small congregation. Like the priest, I am finding myself reflecting more on the humanity of Jesus during this Lent and Easter Season. I am entering Holy Week with a gratefulness for how Jesus humbled himself and became one of us. Jesus chose to enter into the human experience and to suffer with us. Easter reminds us of the triumph of Christ in his resurrection, but it also reminds us of the humanity of Jesus and how he willingly gave up his life and demonstrated love, sacrifice, and inclusion of everyone.

This is an Easter Season we will likely remember for the rest of our lives. For the first time for many of us, we will celebrate Easter by watching a Livestream service. Some of us will eat an Easter meal with a few family members. Others of us might spend the day alone. I encourage us to reach out in kindness in some way. Call a friend who is lonely. Pray for the doctors and nurses who are caring for ill patients on Easter. Pray especially for those who are sick with COVID19 or some other illness. Treasure one another, show love to everyone and remember that Jesus has compassion with us because he suffered as one of us. Let us show our goodness by what we create during this time and how we include the whole world in our thoughts and prayers. Let us put our hope in the resurrection of Jesus, knowing that new life and love will be born from this season of waiting and loss.

Dear Siblings in Christ,

These are truly trying times for all of us as we face a rapidly spreading virus, panic buying that has left grocery shelves nearly empty and supplies in great demand. We have seen the worst in people and the best. Yet, through it all, we take hope in Christ and the promise to never leave us.

We are holding each of you in prayer. Like the rest of the country, our Presbyterian communities are physically separated, but we are still deeply connected through our common humanity, spirituality and strong faith in God.

We are not only with you in prayer and solidarity, we are also here to serve you. In response to increased anxieties surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is committed to supporting mid council leaders and pastors who are on the frontline of preaching words of hope in these times. To assist you in that effort, the church has compiled special resources for pastors, congregational leaders and members. These resources include information about virtual worship services.

We are all in this together as we learn to cope with our new normal. Because the Presbyterian connectional system encourages us to learn from one another, we are encouraging "crowdsourcing" as a way of sharing ideas. What are your needs? What's working well in your church communities? We want to hear from you! Tell us what you need, offer suggestions or suggest resources. Please reach out to us at connected@pcusa.org.

We are hearing the concerns many of you have regarding stewardship. The Presbyterian Foundation offers access to an online giving system that allows congregations to accept secure online donations. We know that many people and congregations are experiencing economic hardship because of the coronavirus. However, for those who are able, we encourage continued support of your local church, and sharing God's love with our neighbors in need worldwide. We are grateful for those presbyteries who are providing financial assistance to congregations. We recognize that not all presbyteries are able to do so. We plan to meet with some mid councils to assess needs, and discern ways in which we might be of assistance.

We are compelled by our faithfulness to Christ's charge to love our neighbors. During this crisis, we are mindful of our denomination's commitment to Matthew 25, and urge compassion for others by not purchasing more supplies than we need, and by speaking out against the racism being directed at some of our Asian siblings. Jesus makes it clear that how we respond to our neighbor is of paramount importance to him. These tough times call for the best of Christian character and actions.

Session notes for Pew News:

Session met March 10, 2020. There was a brief discussion about the coronavirus and what it might mean for the church. All gatherings for worship in the Presbytery have now been halted, and the March Presbytery meeting postponed.

The Men's Breakfast Team was approved to act as agents of Newberg FPC in negotiations with the City of Newberg concerning Emergency Preparedness. A new Facility Fee Schedule for the use of our church space was approved.

During this uncertain time, we urge that you all keep safe but stay connected via phone or internet. The church office is closed, though Chris and Katherine are working to keep our church family connected. To that end, we request that you try to keep up with your financial commitments. Remember, you can give by mail or online.


Palm Sunday with Online Communion
