Grace and Gratitude

I love that in the month of November we are reminded to be thankful. When I worked at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, CA as the Director of Presbyterian Ministries I was

able to meet many different leaders of the Presbyterian Church USA. One phrase I often heard to define the faith of Presbyterians was grace and gratitude. Here is a definition of this theme from Presbyterian theologian and pastor, Joe Small.

"The Christian life is shaped by gratitude – gratitude for the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit. It is by God's grace that we receive the gift of our own lives, and so we are called to shape the whole of our lives by our grateful response. 'The stewardship of all of life' is a common phrase, yet too often stewardship is reduced to an annual program, the annual program is reduced to the means to achieve an end, and the end is reduced to the church budget. 'Gratitude for all of life' may be a way to broaden and deepen our understanding and our use of the gifts God has given us."

During November and the holiday of Thanksgiving we are encouraged to be grateful for all of life. Our mission as the Church is to show our gratitude to Jesus by living for Him and sharing his love with a world in need. It all begins with what Jesus has done for us as our Lord and Savior, who demonstrated compassion for those on the margins and ultimately gave his life out of love on the cross and rose from the grave to conquer death.

Our church has much to be grateful for in this season. Although, we have faced great challenges due to the pandemic, we have remained generous and active in our community. Our Men's Breakfast group and Women's Space for Grace group remain strong communities that provide spiritual and relational connection. AIA Goals for 2023

The Church is at the center of God's strategy for proclaiming and demonstrating His kingdom here on earth. We are called to build up that which Christ has shed His blood to create. Partnering with the church is biblical. It's also strategic. Local urban churches are the focal point for reaching into communities of need. They have the leaders, locations, and leverage that no singular ministry could ever duplicate. Working together multiplies our gifts and theirs to create new, effective, and creative opportunities for the proclamation of the gospel in word and deed.

We equip churches to construct whole-person discipleship and developmental programs that minister to the spiritual and physical needs of children and adults. Our biblically-based tools are geared toward at-risk populations and the working poor and focus on character, life skills, financial wisdom, career development, and job search readiness.

Taliilee & Urgessa - Ethiopia

Taliilee summarizes highlights of their ministry:

Schools: Schools are going to open in this academic year despite the rise in Covid19 and the ongoing political crisis. Pray for God's protection over students and teachers as they return to begin schooling.

Bible Translation: We continue to ask for funding to publish the complete Arsi Oromo Bible. The manuscript is already sent to South Korea and we are praying we will have enough funding to publish them in 2021.

Pray for me as I continue to work from my home office. Pray that God would continue to open ministry opportunities with financial supporters. I'm getting invitations from Oromo churches to lead prayer meetings, preaching and singing over zoom. Pray for Urgessa's safe travel in mid-November to Ethiopia. He plans to return for Christmas.

The Ekblads - Tierra Nueva

Most of the people we relate with at Tierra Nueva do not have a long history with the Bible. They encounter Scripture for the first time through our faith community, personal visits or jail Bible studies.

Recently, I met with Jessica and Jason at a park beside the Skagit River in West Mount Vernon. We've met there three or four times on Friday afternoons for short Bible studies, just then a car rolls slowly up and stops in the street.

"Hey, what's up?" I hadn't seen E for over two years- since he was last in jail before heading to prison. E leaves his car running, gets out and comes over to greet me. I place my Bible on the hood of my car and we catch up.

I drive to a nearby store, where I suddenly realize my Bible is missing. Had I driven off with it on the hood of the car?! Around 10pm I head back to the park to search for my Bible again, searching along the sides of the road. The next morning I get an email that warms my heart: "Mr. Ekblad, found precious item that belongs to you. I'm Jose and would like to return to you. Email me or call me. Not to worry, it's safe! Jose."

He includes his number and I call him. He welcomes me to his house twenty minutes north of us and returns my Bible.

October would have been the month that the Deacons typically held their Deacon Auction at the church. It has been so much fun with good food and good friends and so many fun items to bid on, like: picnics, dinners, yummy treats, unique items, holiday baskets, etc. But unfortunately that couldn't happen this year with Covid-19 with no large group gatherings, social distancing, masks, etc.. Hopefully that can happen next October or so.

Then there is the Fire Department Toy and Joy Drive that we usually hold in November. The congregation donates toys for children for Christmas. A Deacon(s) take the toys to the Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue station in Newberg where the firemen and volunteers organize toys by ages and deliver toys to children and teens in our area who would likely not receive toys otherwise. We don't want folks to feel like they have to go to stores, during Covid-19 to buy toys and deliver them to the church. If you want to do this you can, or if you would like to donate toys but don't feel comfortable shopping a Deacon(s) could shop for you. The last date to deliver toys or donate money would be December 1st.

Our Adult Bible Studies Class spent this summer exploring and learning about the Psalms. However, for the last two Tuesdays, the class, led by Bruce Murphy, explored the relationship between Christian faith and patriotism. Together they discussed:

What does the Bible say?

The Old Testament- The church and the nation are one. Faith/religion needs the power of the nation to survive. The nation needs the power of faith to thrive. Patriotism and faith are two sides of the same coin.

The New Testament - Jesus acknowledges the need for the nation to provide order with justice... but calls his followers to replace political power with the power of love as the means to build the God's Kingdom...and thereby strengthen all of society.

What does the Constitution of the United States say? Official separation of church and state with freedom of religion. Faith and human reasoning are both gifts of God to be used together for the common good. Patriotism for the Christian involves building the nation through holy living, acts of sacrificial love, genuine evangelism and the willingness to reason together with those who disagree.

Now, Pastor Chris is asking members (including those checking in for the first time) what they feel called to study. So bring your ideas and choices to class this Tuesday at noon and be prepared to set the theme for the following weeks.
