The Session meeting this month was full of good news:

Rosemary and Gene Dykema and Bob and Libbi Hamilton were interviewed for membership at FPC. Their life experiences and desire to join to serve the Lord and our congregation are encouraging.

All three prongs of Christian Spiritual Formation classes are going strong: Adult Ed, Children's Worship, and CAYAC.

Fellowship following services is once again in full swing thanks to the work of the Deacons who are also planning for visitation of the homebound in the new year.

We have received, or are applying for, three grants for our church - Thriving Congregations Grant from George Fox has granted FPC \$15,000; A grant from the Presbytery was awarded for \$10,000 to help repair our gas lines and get the heat on; and a grant is in the writing stage to help us replace aging technology for our services and live-streaming.

The gas leak and doors are repaired.

Advent at FPC has been a busy and encouraging time for the pastor who has been meeting with various committees, visiting homebound, and holding new member classes.

Our mission partner, Taliilee Figruu, will be back with us, preaching Feb. 20th!

Other Session Action:

Our good friend and former intern Nissi Undurthi has requested scholarship help as she continues her graduate studies at the Washington University in St. Louis. She writes, "I am studying Master of Public Health specializing in Global Health. My desire continues to be to work for the development of low-income countries and communities like Thondangi, the village I come from." The Session is delighted to meet her request.

The church budget for 2022 was submitted by the Finance and Facilities team and approved by Session. A big thank you to Doug and Susan King and their hard work in keeping our finances in order and helping us be good stewards of all that God has given to us as a church family.



placed this many gift box orders to Equal Exchange: 18 Solidarity Boxes & 31 Chocolate Collection Boxes, for a monetary total of \$1,530.00. WHOOPEE!

Many have asked how to make future orders. I'll try to explain. At the time the church approved the coffee project the decision was made that it was a mission project not a fund-raiser. Products would be sold at or near cost. EE Interfaith partners buy at wholesale price. BUT (here's the rub) products must be purchased by the case. This usually means six 12oz. pkg. coffee/case and twelve 2.8oz. chocolate bars/case, and so forth for other EE products. This is a reasonable request if one is a regular coffee drinker or chocolate eater. It becomes not as reasonable when purchasing tea (1 case = 6 boxes, 20 bags/box = 120 tea bags) and ridiculous if purchasing Palestinian Extra Virgin Olive Oil (6 bottles/case). One would do this only by sharing a case. It is financially and logistically impossible at First Presbyterian to keep an extensive inventory of products on hand. Therefore, the policy is to sell by the case. Orders are made monthly providing an order meets the free shipping criteria of \$135.00.

Equal Exchange has 15 different packaged coffees from which to choose: drip, grind or whole bean, light to dark roast, and single sourced or blended. It is a bit much to require a new buyer to purchase a case of a product they have never tasted. Therefore, January/February sales will be an exception to policy. Cases of best-selling EE coffees (6) have been purchased. These coffees will be on sale by the package after service in the Fellowship Hall beginning January 16th. Prices are \$7, \$8, or \$9 /pkg., depending on the product. I do round up to the nearest dollar when selling single bags. During fellowship, stop by the Coffee Cart to see what's there!

Fun facts about calendars and the four upcoming celebrations

- The Ethiopian year is marked by the older Julian calendar, with twelve 30-day months and a catch-up month at the end
- In Ethiopia, it is now 2014 (you're seven years younger than you thought!)
- The Ethiopian year 2014 started in September
- Coming up, the Gregorian calendar's Christmas comes December 25th, right after the winter solstice, as days start getting longer and long nights recede
- •The Gregorian calendar's New Year comes next, and passes unnoticed in Ethiopia--but we wish you a happy one, here in the US!
- Then Genna, the Ethiopian celebration of Jesus' birth, falls on what the Gregorian calendar calls Twelfth Night
- Genna is not a big holiday, but some elements of Christmas are being adopted by Ethiopian city people
- And finally, Timket comes on January 19th. It is a huge Ethiopian Orthodox Church celebration of Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist and a reenactment of personal baptism

Church Community Emergency Planning

Our church has been designated as a neighborhood center by the City of Newberg to have a supply of potable (safe drinkable) water in the event of a disaster (such as earthquake, fire, etc.) that would cut off the city's water system. The process will be to place a storage container with necessary filtration equipment and supplies to produce drinkable water from any source; creeks, fire truck, etc. and convert it to clean water for the community surrounding our church property.



We will be one of the first of a planned placement of these containers at schools, churches and other public facilities over a period of time. The Men's breakfast group has formed an Emergency Preparedness Committee in accordance with a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the church and the City of Newberg.

The storage container or POD will be placed at the north end of the fire lane parallel to the Education/Office Building. Major equipment and supplies in the POD are:

- Storage pod
- Hurricane filtration unit
- Folding frame water tank 3000 Gallon for raw water
- A 1000 watt generator
- 330-gallon finished Water Tote

Our MOU with the City includes the following items:

- Prepare its employees, constituents, and members for emergencies arising from natural disasters
- Form an Emergency Preparedness Committee.
- Create an internal notification phone tree network
- Coordinate with Newberg to train and utilize communication protocols
- Allow the name of the Church to be identified as an emergency assistance site on the Newberg website
- Develop a traffic control pattern for water pickup

Our men's group will be attending a training a session regarding the contents of the POD on February 3, 2022 and the POD should be placed on the site soon. Stay tuned for other information.
