Streams of Living Water

Welcome to the Season of Lent, a time in our church calendar dedicated to deepening our relationship with Jesus! On Wednesday, March 2nd, we will begin the Lenten Season with Ash Wednesday, a day to remember the fragility and beauty of life. Then we will enter a 40-day period of spiritual reflection in preparation for the great celebration of the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday.

How is your heart as we enter this Lenten Season? Are you feeling tired or weary with the burdens of your life? Are you anxious? If so, you are not alone. God encourages us to see this season as a time of rest and renewal. This is a journey of self-care, self-compassion, and self-love. This is a time to bask in God's love and recommit ourselves to our spiritual lives.

This year as a church community during Lent we will be exploring Richard Foster's book Streams of Living Water, Celebrating the Great Traditions of Christian Faith. Foster is a Quaker minister who graduated from Fox University and once served as an Associate Pastor at the Newberg Friends church. He reminds us that the living water of the Holy Spirit is active in six streams of Christian faith: the evangelical, contemplative, charismatic, social justice, holiness, and incarnational stream. I encourage you to consider purchasing this book to learn more about these streams and to help you follow along with the Lenten sermon series.

My dad Bruce Murphy first introduced me to the writings of Richard Foster in the 1980's and 90's when he worked as a Presbyterian pastor in two churches. Foster helped inspire my dad to integrate his reformed/ evangelical Presbyterian faith background with contemplative, charismatic, and social justice expressions of the church.

Over the last few years, I have had the privilege to do some teaching with Richard Foster's ministry Renovaré. I have found that exploring the different Christian streams helps keep my Christian faith alive and creative. I hope this Season of Lent may be a time of enjoying the diversity and beauty of our Christian traditions as we seek to deepen our relationship with Jesus. May we enjoy the journey of Lent together!

Deacons welcome Jen Henry as the newly installed deacon. The annual Food Drive for FISH is going on in February.

Christian Ed- discussed and approved an updated version of our scholarship application for those seeking higher education. Applications are available through the Christian Ed committee or the church office.

Finance and Facilities- According to our treasure's report for January, currently the undesignated funds for general expenses is at +\$7,499. The F & F committee is reviewing bids to remove rotting and diseased cherry trees along Mission Drive. The fellowship hall doors are now in good working order. The City of Newberg emergency planning is in the process of installing a large emergency water unit for our neighborhood on our church property. Other units are being installed throughout the community for other neighborhoods.

Worship, Music, Media, and Technology- Our Lenten season will begin March 2nd with an Ash Wednesday service at 6:30pm in the sanctuary as well as live-streamed for viewers at home. We have received a \$4,000 technology grant to help off-set the cost of upgrades to our old outdated equipment.

We celebrate the many different things that are happening in our church to keep our facilities and technology updated. We look forward to continued growth in our congregation with new vitality.

I attribute **your** presence on the MDC team, and the miracle of my telephone connection with **Ato Markos** in Maji to powers far beyond my own. What is happening through MDC--responding to people's struggles, changing their circumstances and giving them hope--is clearly infused with love. Thank you.

Your generosity in November and December* allows MDC to start immediately on the clean water project that will change the lives of 400 families. In a call last week with Ato Markos, we agreed that my next job is to:

• Complete fundraising (only \$20K left);

• Cut through red tape at the Ethiopian embassy in Washington DC (or find a plan B!).

Ato Markos's next job is to:

- Negotiate cost-sharing agreements with district and local village leaders;
- Consult with the Ethiopian water specialist to organize the work.

Ato Markos also reported that the small rains have come, which means a good harvest--another source of gratitude in Maji, a most/y agricultural district.



Ato Markos (center L in L photo) built the reservoir for the only protected spring in Maji District. He is providentially suited to supervise the spring-fed clean water system for Siski and Adikas villages, off the mountainside from Maji town.



Story books for children are only just becoming "a thing" in Ethiopia. The Ready Set Go Book series created by my sister Jane, son Kenny and me are produced by **Open Hearts Big Dreams** Fund as one prototype for a young industry. They are bilingual, and translated into several Ethiopian languages. These children are reading their first stories ever, and in Dizin, their own language!

The Experience of Lent By Karen Murphy, Ph.D.

What is Lent?

Lent (meaning "springtime") is a period of 40 days (excluding Sundays) prior to Easter which the early church set aside as a time of preparation. It is a time of preparation of one's heart, mind, and soul, which allows one to fully embrace, experience, and live into the depth of the Paschal mystery that is presented to us in Christ's death and resurrection. It is a time in which we are called, in continuity with other Christians throughout the ages, to pray, repent, fast, listen, refocus, and remember.

During this season, we pray for grace, grace to see ourselves as we truly are. We pray for strength, strength not only to see our desperate, limited, and often desolate humanness, but also for the strength to see God as He truly is, with arms open wide, waiting to refresh us with hope, compassion, and peace. We pray that the Spirit of the living God will empower us in fresh, new ways as we seek to serve, to learn, to live, and to love. We repent of the times that we have fallen short, of the moments when we have not been kind, when we have not lived justly, when we have been selfish and fearful, when we were not present to the people around us.

During this season, we choose to fast, sacrificing our own desires, wants, and needs, in order that we may be re-sensitized to the needs of the world around us, to the cries for love and the cries for justice. We set aside our own incessant cravings that we may hear the ever-present still, small voice of God speaking to us in the midst of a world filled with noise, with busyness, with "doing," with mindlessness. We fast in order that we may hear again, that we may recognize our own longings for life, for healing, for love, that we may live mindfully in the present, truly seeing one another as sons and daughters of God.

And, finally, during this season we remember. We remember that we are but dust, that we were created from dust and to dust we shall return. We remember that we were bought with a price, that we are not our own, and that we are deeply, deeply loved in the midst of our brokenness, in the midst of our shortcomings, in the midst of our failings, and in the midst of our weakness. We are reminded that God is ever present, never changing and that we are forever held by His great mercy. Lent is a time of prayer, repentance, fasting, remembering, and celebrating what and whose we are. During this Lenten season, may you experience God's gracious and loving presence as you wait in expectation for the day when, by His Spirit, all is made new.
