Easter Season

I hope you are enjoying the Season of Lent as we as a community prepare our hearts for the gift of Easter morning. The resurrection of Jesus is the pinnacle of his life because the truth of life after death is made visible in his resurrected body. The basis for our own faith in eternal life when we die is founded on Jesus' resurrection. Jesus says, "I am the resurrection and the life" (John 11:25). Through Jesus we have the gift of eternal life.

I wonder if you are like me as we prepare for Easter. I am cautiously hopeful that our experience together may begin to feel more like normal life before the pandemic. I understand we need to still be careful and make wise decisions about our health, but I am hoping we can release our fear over time as cases hopefully continue to decrease and the science shows we are in a safer place. We need a resurrection after the suffering of the last two years. We are also praying for resurrection in places where violence continues to cause chaos and fear like the country of Ukraine.

Resurrection is shown in the story of Jesus who conquers death and offers us eternal life that begins right now and continues forever. Resurrection also refers to the seasons of new life when hope arises like the sunshine on an early morning as the dew still rests on the green grass. Resurrection is shown in the bursting of fresh flowers and the brightness of color as we treasure the amazing diversity of God's creation.

This Easter on April 17th we will be in person in the sanctuary for the first time since the Easter of 2019. As is our custom, the week before we will celebrate Palm Sunday with waving palm branches. On Maundy Thursday, we will encourage you to remember the Lord's Supper as you share a meal in your own homes. On Good Friday, we will meet in person for a prayer retreat at church from 9 AM to 12 noon reflecting on the suffering of Christ and our own feelings of lament. On Easter morning, we will enjoy a light breakfast of pastries and fruit in the Fellowship Hall at 9 AM followed by a celebration of the resurrection with worship at 10:30 AM, including the placing of flowers on the cross.

May the hope of the resurrection fill us with joy as we find courage to walk through our lives with more love than fear, with hope even as we struggle with despair at times, with peace knowing that the Christ who conquered death is with us always.

Our Session meeting this month was blessed with God's provisions of our Christian Education Building Mortgage being paid off through generous donations to the Capital Campaign with the \$4,248.03 remaining in that fund getting transferred to our Facilities Capital Campaign fund towards building improvements such as air conditioning

in the sanctuary and floors in the Fellowship Hall. Thanks to Gary Buck's hard work and God's blessings we also received a \$4,000 grant towards new audio visual equipment for the sanctuary. We also praised God for Doug and Susan King's amazing generous work with our church finances as well as Pam Fogg's leadership training many volunteers how to do a church financial review of our 2020 files. We all learned a lot and are already putting her terrific suggestions into practice.

Other praises were for our Streams of Living Water Lentin sermon series, Sunday School's Women in the Old Testament Study Melissa Ramos, Sara Hailemeskel. Thomas Millage, and Anna Virginia Millage graduating from George Fox at the end of April, our new scholarship application form, the dangerous trees coming down soon for safety for our church neighbors, and the Men's Breakfast Group taking charge of an emergency water collection tank for our church neighborhood. Care Group calls have begun, and we are so grateful to God that Corinne Waterbury headed up those terrific teams to bring our church members closer together and share prayer requests and praises.

Plans are in the works for sharing our Holy Week activities with the community including a light breakfast Easter morning and decorating the cross with fresh flowers Easter Sunday. Masks are no longer required but are encouraged as we move from signing in to just respectfully caring for each other's health during our worship time with hand sanitizer and free masks at the entrance to the sanctuary each week.

Also occurring each week will be Remnant Initiative Tuesday meals in the Fellowship Hall. We are so excited to offer this outreach and will see it extending to our community and congregation this spring. Chair Yoga continues each Monday and Wednesday with the exception of Lory's spring break so NO YOGA March 21st and 23rd. Speaking of spring, we welcome Portland Seminary's pastoral intern Laura Fuller this coming May. We will learn more about Laura in May but look forward to getting to know her and learning from her in the near future.

After spring comes summer with our church holding another fantastic bazaar the first Saturday of June. This event will rotate every other year with our church rummage sale. Through the year we reach out with our mission projects which will be including One Great Hour of Sharing this Easter Season and providing bikes for a refugee family from Afghanistan thanks to the incredible organization of Elise working with volunteers in our community to restore bikes for outreach ministry to our community. Our college outreach, CAYAC, has been rotating meeting in person and on zoom. For those wanting to gather to pray for Newberg the Mayor's Prayer Breakfast is April 2, from 8:30-10:00 at the Chehalem Cultural Center.

These are just snapshots from our Session meeting but suffice it to say that all of us worked together praising God and seeking guidance from above to be responsible disciples reaching out to our community and each other as we seek spiritual transformation through God's gracious gift of Jesus Christ.

Such sweet successes in Maji Relationships were renewed after two fallow years!

It was wonderful to see Ato Markos and other friends, and to meet and shake hands with new community leaders--the hospital administrator, the mayor of Maji town, and the district administrator.

But best of all was what prompted the trip--distributing 150 solar lanterns to students who have no evening light for homework. The solar lighting kits we've mounted on grass and tin roofs will last longer and give more light, but for some families, they are out of reach. This project, jointly set up by Ato Samson of Solar Energy Foundation and Ato Markos of MDC, is a perfect supplement to the solar home lighting kits. Just look at the faces of these children!







(right) Ato Markos urged the children to use the lights to study--to share with their brothers and sisters who also have homework--and to benefit their whole families. He reported that the town was abuzz with joy the next day. We've done bigger things . . .this was closest to the heart (it's hard to fall in love with a hospital, but a solar lantern . . . \clubsuit \circledast all over town!)

The Global Happiness Report We've been through a pandemic. Are we in despair? NO!

Researchers found that yes, we had more stress, sadness and worry during the pandemic, but markers of happiness (laughter, enjoyment and particularly the joy of learning something new) increased, keeping the world enjoying moments of happiness twice as often per day than moments of unhappiness.

Then, in 2021 our levels of stress went down and acts of kindness (volunteering, donating and helping strangers) increased by 25%!

I had an experience of this two weeks ago. I fell on the slippery side of a pool. It made quite a stir, and five or six strangers rushed to help me. When the chaos had settled and all the strangers had gone back to their friends, another man came over. "I saw you dropped your drink. I want to buy you another."

Besides the good news that I did not break any bones or do permanent damage to my no-longer-young body, the "good news" of the kindness of strangers has stayed with me, giving me ongoing happiness. People are good.

CELEBRATING COLLABORATION

On December 9, 2021, Valley Community PC, Portland, in partnership with LCSNW (Lutheran Community Services of the Northwest), welcomed an Afghan refugee family to Portland. The family consisting of a single dad and seven children ranging in age from 16 months to 13 years of age, are now living in Valley's "Sanctuary House," one of three rental homes owned by the church. An army of volunteers from Valley have been working tirelessly to resettle this dear family and will continue to do so for up to the next year. Ask any one of the Valley volunteers and they will tell you this is a total labor of love...this family has captured the hearts of Valley congregants. On Saturday, March 12, the Valley volunteers partnered with the good people of First, Newberg to secure bicycles for this dear family through the Newberg church's bicycle rehab ministry. The smiles on the faces of the children communicate their joy and gratitude as they received and learned to ride their new bicycles. Thanks be to God for this joy-filled and collaborative effort between the Valley, Portland and First, Newberg congregations!!









WHEN THE BODY OF CHRIST WORKS TOGETHER ...

For those who have contributed to this worthy cause, here's the latest update...again, from the Cascades Connections March Newsletter:

In the three weeks or so since the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) issued an appeal for help, Presbyterians have donated nearly \$1 million in response to the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine.

"We are grateful for that," the Rev. Dr. Laurie Kraus, director of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, said Wednesday during the Lifting Up Ukraine: PC(USA)'s Humanitarian Response webinar, which you can view by clicking <u>here</u> or <u>here</u>.

During the first week of the appeal, PDA sent a \$50,000 emergency grant to its partners working in countries bordering Ukraine. More will be sent this week. "It's a small amount for now," Kraus said. "We will move to

larger grants in the mid-term and long-term" to help partners develop, among other things, sustainable housing solutions. *For more information you can read more <u>here.</u>*

So, What's With the Big Green Box?

This is actually our gift to the community around us, the gift of clean water in an emergency such as an earthquake, big fire, etc. that would cause loss of City water. The "Box" contains equipment that can take dirty water from any source and filter it to a drinkable level.

We are part of the City of Newberg's plan to provide a clean water source for the immediate community. Our Men's Breakfast group is responsible for using the equipment if needed. Currently five of these boxes (or "pods") are placed in other locations around the city with eventual plans for more as they become available. Churches, schools, fire stations, etc. will be the eventual sites.

Some time in the near future when Covid concerns lower and the weather is warmer, the City will demonstrate the contents of the Box to the community and our church folks. This activity actually started in 2019 when we gathered the community to our church for a demonstration of emergency resources and they demonstrated the water filter for us. Stay tuned for further developments.

Equal Exchange Gift to PCUSA and Chocolate!

Equal Exchange throughout the year dedicates a monetary gift to its interfaith communities. Notice has been received that during the month of April 10% of our total purchase will be donated to the Presbyterian Hunger Program for famers in Gaza. I will be taking orders up to the deadline Wednesday April 27th, and will place an order whenever the total is \$136.00 (free shipping).

The Presbyterian Hunger Program is part of the Peace and Justice ministry at PCUSA. Its mission is to alleviate hunger and eliminate the causes. The approach is holistically with five tools: direct food relief, sustainable development, advocacy, intentional and sustainable living, and education. It is this ministry that decides where the EE funds will be used.

Also, during April I will be introducing chocolate products that EE sells. It is the appropriate time to do so since secular Easter celebration involves bunnies and eggs, particularly the chocolate ones! The justice part of cacao is not only the support for small acreage farmers but also about the extensive use of child labor, particularly in Africa. The EE product line includes Chocolate Bars, Minis and Chips plus Cocoa, both baking and drinking. The Coffee Cart during Fellowship Hour will have available a variety of chocolate flavors to taste. **Chocolate needs to be ordered this month or one must wait until October**.
