

Favorite Bible Stories



Do you remember your first exposure to the Bible? As a child, I remember my mom showing me her black leather Holy Bible. It seemed well worn and I knew from that day on I wanted to read the Bible with the same dedication as my parents. As a teenager, I read both a kid's picture Bible and got my first youth study Bible. I began reading one chapter of the gospels each night before bed. I learned growing up that the Bible was God's word and the most important book I would ever read. I am so glad I grew up with a love for the Bible and the powerful stories within it that reveal God's love for the world.


The month of June begins with Pentecost Sunday on June 5th. Pentecost reminds us of the power of the Holy Spirit and the gift of unity as followers of Jesus. The story of Pentecost will also be the first story of our summer sermon series on Favorite Bible Stories. Our new pastoral intern Laura Fuller and I will be preaching some of our favorite Bible stories from the Old and New Testament. Our goal will be to include stories of women and men and to cover multiple books of the Bible.

As we explore some of our favorite Bible stories, I encourage you to also consider what stories especially have formed your faith. How has the Bible revealed to you the Living Word, who is Jesus the Christ? As Christians we believe the Bible is inspired by God. We learn about God through creation, through prayer and through various spiritual experiences. We learn about God from other people of faith who share wisdom with us. But as believers, the Bible remains a powerful way God reveals to us God's story through the people of Israel, the life of Jesus, and through letters and stories of the early Church.

If you are like me, you have had both positive and negative experiences reading Scripture. Some stories from the Bible feel troubling or confusing. I know it might be tempting to put the Bible on the bookshelf and only pull it out when going through a hard time. I encourage us to reflect this summer on the value of the Bible and why we need to continue to immerse ourselves in the powerful stories of Scripture that reveal God's love and plan for creation. My prayer is that our love for the Bible will be refreshed this summer as we explore the wisdom of God revealed in its pages.


Space for Grace is going on vacation in style!!

Dear Presbytery of the Cascades Ministers and Church Leaders,

At the Friday, March 11 meeting of the presbytery, we adopted new mission and vision statements for the work and direction of the presbytery. I want to personally thank you for your patience and participation in this process. Four years ago, I began meeting with all the congregations of the presbytery in order to hear your hopes and concerns, discover what we shared in common, and listen for the vision that is emerging before us.

Two years ago, the coronavirus hit us with tsunami-like force. The pandemic both suspended the work of adopting a shared vision and made the need for a shared vision more urgent and apparent. Last week the presbytery adopted the work of the Strategic Planning Team after fourteen months of praying, listening, wrestling, discerning, and editing. I was both delighted and relieved that we crossed this important threshold together.

The heart of our new mission and vision is this: Rooted in God's love, we are presbytery committed to collaborative mission between our churches, ecumenical partners, and community entities.

I believe that two compelling factors are at play that tell us that this is the right time, the Kairos moment, for a collaborative model for the presbytery.

- 1. The truth is we have an increasing number of congregations who no longer have the people and financial resources to be sustainable on their own. These congregations have a rare and rich opportunity to invite other churches and community partners to share buildings, staff and mission initiatives. The result will be churches that continue to remain viable and/or create sustainable, innovative models for the future of the church. It may sound counter-intuitive, but it is these churches who will play a central role in paving the way to a new future.
- 2. In recent years, the ecumenical spirit that started over a hundred years ago has now expanded to include community partners, government agencies, and even businesses committed to the social good. We have discovered that in this diverse society that many others share our commitment to mission even if they do not share our same faith. In this rich time of opportunity, we in the church will continue to carry the name of Jesus Christ, and, the mission of Jesus Christ will be embodied in the broader community in a web of collaborative partnerships of which we will be a part.

Strangely enough, I remember decades ago singing about this kind of collaboration at church camp. Read the lyrics of "They'll Know We are Christians by our Love" and see how closely this well-known hymn and camp song mirrors our new mission and vision statements *Please CLICK HERE* for the new mission and vision statements.
