




"Peace and Unity"

Recently I spoke to the Kiwanis group here in Newberg about my life journey and how my family came to our church. Bob Andrews invited me to join Kiwanis when I became the pastor here, and I enjoy connecting with the broader Newberg community through this club that has a special heart for children and youth. During my talk with Kiwanis, I shared some thoughts on how our church is growing younger and some of the exciting new things happening with our congregation. I mentioned to Kiwanis that one of the key ideas of our church is that we seek to build bridges and unity here in Newberg. We also seek to be a community of peace.

In a recent sermon on the Mary and Martha story I shared about the value of contemplative listening and that our church is seeking to be among other things a Christian Spirituality Center for people to deepen their experience of listening to Jesus. I highlighted that one way our church campus is fostering this value is by creating the Newberg Peace Garden. The Newberg Peace Garden will be a place of beauty behind our church fellowship hall that draws both religious and non-religious people to find peace, rest, and God's love. Ciaran Hynes, an active new attender of our church, is leading the design and development of this garden with the support and insight of Sylvia Burns and others in our community. We are praying for God to bring deeper unity and hope through this project. It will include a peace path and labyrinth to help foster a deeper awareness of God's presence in nature. Over time many plants and flowers will be grown to add to the beauty of this land. The initial funding of \$5,000 for this project is coming from the Thriving Congregation grant from Portland Seminary that we received at the end of 2021. Stay tuned for a future article on the progress we are making on this exciting project.

One other positive highlight of this summer is that we are enjoying special gatherings for community building like our church picnic and a special Youth and Family barbecue at the Hynes home. In this Pew News we share some of the photos of these fun events. It is a joy to find ways to build friendships as we worship and serve God together. May God continue to bless our efforts to bring light and love to the community of Newberg as we listen to the heart of Jesus and seek to bring people together with a heart for intergenerational community. We're thankful for how this multinational, multiethnic team is taking significant steps in training and empowering gospel leaders all over the globe. We recently got some tough test results—Eric has been diagnosed with prostate cancer. It's been a period of learning, praying and making decisions about next steps. Because of the level of aggressiveness, volume and risk of spread in relation to his age, it is recommended that he pursue treatment sooner than later.

We gather around and lay hands on him, praying for his healing. Almost immediately he notices a big change. He is astonished as he starts to breathe more freely, and we notice the volume of his voice increases significantly. We all marvel at the beautiful presence of Jesus moving in our midst, delighted by the radical goodness of God.


SPACE FOR GRACE

The LIFE HISTORY of an EE TEA BAG

When you dunk a tea bag into a cup of hot water do you ever wonder about how I came to be? Well, here is a brief summary of my life.

Planting and Growing: My plant name is Camilla sinensis and a great number, millions, of us are planted and grown in tropical and subtropical climates in countries such as China, India, and Sri Lanka. I'm from the Potong Tea Garden in the Darjeeling region of India. Potong is a worker owned collective. The workers not only grow and harvest me but also own the land. They are good land stewards and don't use caustic pesticides and fertilizers. I'm a shrub with very green leaves and in two or three years after planting I'm ready to be picked.

Plucking: Picking is delicate, hands only, for what is wanted is only my stem tips consisting of a few young leaves surrounding a bud before it flowers. I and my buddies are in our youth when picked. Withering: We're all now tiny stems with a couple of tender leaves and a bud. All of us find ourselves in a bag. We are carted off to be dumped and spread out to dry. This reduces our water content and makes us more pliable. What comes next is frightful.

Disruption (leaf maceration): We are intentionally brutally bruised by being shaken, rolled and/or crushed to tear our skin and break our cell structure to release enzymes. Ouch!

Oxidation (fermentation): This is the crucial process because these enzyme driven chemical reactions will determine what type of tea we will become. With little oxidation we will stay green and become green tea. With lots of oxidation we'll turn dark and become black tea. Remember all tea comes from the same genesis of plant. It's all very complex.

Fixation: to stop the oxidation process at the right time we are heated to a temperature where the enzymes stop working.

Finally, we are **Sorted** removing any impurities like stems or seeds and **Packaged** either loose leaf or in tiny bags.

Now we 're ready to be **Purchased** by Equal Exchanged and **Sold** from the Coffee Cupboard at First Presbyterian Church.

My buddies and I are proud of our lives We started out as young leaves on a faraway bush. We are now making you a delicious, comforting drink. "Happy Teatime!"
