

# "Celebrating Our Mission and Identity in Christ"



## From the Reverend Chris Murphy— Celebrating Our Mission and Identity in Christ

The Fall Season is an opportunity for us to remember who we are as a church community as we welcome new visitors and recommit ourselves to the mission of Jesus Christ in our world. In October, we are specifically doing the important work of stewardship planning and we are being invited to support the peacemaking efforts of the Presbyterian Church (USA) through our Peacemaking offering.

To help us be reminded of our mission as a church, we are spending October and November exploring the Book of Colossians as a church family. The Book of Colossians is written by the Apostle Paul in order to encourage the church in Colossae to remember the Lordship of Jesus Christ and to embrace the resurrected life available in Jesus.

Paul writes this letter when he is in his first imprisonment in Rome. He is writing in response to the request of Epaphras, who is a convert from Paul's previous mission work in Ephesus. Epaphras is the leader of the church in Colossae and seeks Paul's guidance with different challenges the church is facing.

One of the great quotes of this book comes from Colossians 3: 12-15.

"12 Therefore, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. 13 Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. 14 Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. 15 And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful."

My prayer as we come together for worship on Sundays and as we follow Jesus in our service throughout the week is that we embody the compassion, peace, and love of God to one another, our neighbors in Newberg, and broader world. In this October Pew News, you will notice we are embracing our mission for Christ in so many ways. With the guidance of Ciarán Hynes and recent support of the George Fox community, we are building the Newberg Peace Garden and fostering the value of peace in our city. We are celebrating first responders with an annual Pie Social. With the help of volunteer teachers, we are providing community and education for all ages, children through adults. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, we are supporting our mission partners both locally and abroad. May God continue to guide us as church

Our September Session meeting opened with Bob Andrews for leading our opening devotion followed by the glorious sharing of faith journeys of five dear brothers and sisters who are excited to join our church family: David Chris, Esther Chris, Ciarán Hynes, Mindi Hynes, and Cate Murphy. Deep appreciation to Bob Andrews for leading our opening devotion as I had fallen asleep in my chair at home and was 15 minutes late to our meeting. God knew that I needed that short power nap.

Our session is excited about the George Fox University student volunteers who helped the Peace Garden take shape this Wednesday, September 14, for Serve Day. A new refrigerator was purchased by anonymous donor to be delivered on Thursday, September 15th, as the old one stopped cooling. We praise God for the generosity and timeliness of this donation to the Fellowship Hall kitchen.

Session approved a \$1,000. College Scholarship for Justice Sandoz from our Au Scholarship Fund, Karen Murphy's use of the Fellowship Hall on October 17th, and the hiring of part time Assistant Childcare Providers, Sandra Fish and Lewis Thurston who will be alternating supporting Miriam Staples.


Session approved the Treasurer's Report with August contributions totaling \$17,149. which was an increase from July's \$9,280, thanks be to God. Session discussed the process of installing Pastor Chris Murphy as our full-time installed minister and voted to begin the steps to install him through our Presbytery's lengthy process. Presbytery is our denominations central ruling "office" (kind of like a spiritual and financial legislature.) It is exciting to see the Spirit working in our church and a blessing to have Chris Murphy leading us on this journey.

## THE PEACE & GLOBAL WITNESS SPECIAL OFFERING The Sundays Surrounding October 2. "God Spreads a Table of Peace Before Us"

There are four Special Offerings of the Presbyterian Church (USA); the Peace and Global Witness Offering is one of these four. Received to celebrate World Communion Sunday, the first Sunday in October, it supports the peacemaking work of the Church at every level, and provides an opportunity to witness to God's Peace-giving in the world. We are called to be agents of reconciliation for individuals, families and communities at home and internationally.

Each congregation is encouraged to retain 25% of this offering for its own Peacemaking efforts. Our Mission and Global Witness Committee, with Session's approval, has decided that, on the behalf of First Presbyterian Church, our 25% will again be presented to Henderson House, a Safe House for women and children fleeing domestic violence. Of the remainder, 25% will be used to support Presbytery and Synod Peacemaking, and 50% will be forwarded to the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program of the General Assembly (the national level of PC(USA). We, who enjoy so much peace in our lives compared to so much of the rest of the world, have an opportunity with this offering, to share a portion of our good fortune with others in great need. We hope you will wish to participate! You may use a Peace and Global Witness Offering envelope found in the pews beginning in mid-September, or simply denote Peace Offering on any envelope, and on the memo line of your check. Thank you so much!





#### It's CHOCOLATE TIME AGAIN!

My October order to Equal Exchange will again offer chocolate. Those who are already "hooked" on delicious EE chocolate bars can restock and others can join. During the month I plan, on several Sundays, to have samples to taste.

This year EE is celebrating twenty years of its chocolate program. One might call it their 20th "Chocoversary". When I began selling EE products in 2002, I had two products, coffee and tea. The first chocolate product, Hot Cocoa Mix, was introduced soon after. The sources were from farmer owned cooperatives: cacao from Dominican Republic, sugar from Paraguay, and dairy from the USA (Organic Valley). Next came baking cocoa in 2003 and in 2006, the first three chocolate bars, Organic Very Dark, Almond Dark and Milk Chocolate. In 2008 the bestselling bar was introduced, Organic Panama Extra Dark Chocolate, my favorite. A more recent chocolate product is Organic Chocolate Chips.

Today there are eleven varieties of bars, chocolate minis, hot cocoa mixes, baking chocolates, and chocolate chips. The EE cacao is sourced from four different countries: Peru, Panama, Dominican Republic, and Togo, I do not have an extensive enough clientele to have an inventory of all products. Except for the mini at 25 cents per piece, all orders must be by the case. I am hopeful that interest in EE products will increase to the point where a few of the popular bars can be sold separately. A case has 12 bars therefore I need 12 buyers for the same variety. Stop by the Coffee Cart, have a taste and tell me what you like!
