Lent and Celtic Christianity



From the Reverend Chris Murphy— Exploring Celtic Christianity This Lent

You may have noticed in some of my sermons over the last couple of months that I have occasionally made references to ideas from Celtic Christianity or Celtic Spirituality. As a pastor, I always look for inspiration as I listen to the guidance of the Holy Spirit and interpret Scripture. Lately, I am reading about Celtic Christianity from authors like John Philip Newell who wrote the book Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul and John O'Donohue, who wrote the book Anam Cara. I encourage you to consider reading both of these books.

My excitement about Celtic Spirituality comes from my own sense that Celtic Christianity offers wisdom that can help give inspiration to the Church today as we seek to offer the Gospel to the world. The heart of the Gospel as the message and life of Jesus as revealed in Scripture does not change, but the institutional Church at times needs a new lens or a new wineskin in which to communicate the message of the Gospel to our world.

Many people today are leaving Church because the Gospel is being presented in an old wineskin of an aging church that does not inspire mission for Christ in the world. Celtic Christianity offers a theological, spiritual, and missional approach to Christian faith that is very exciting and offers a new wineskin for a new generation. Part of what makes Celtic Christianity attractive is its emphasis on a more positive view of humanity, a love for nature as an expression of God's love revealed in our world, and a deep enjoyment of Arts and culture. Although, Celtic Spirituality was born largely from the region of Ireland, Scotland, England, and Wales, the insights from this tradition are a blessing for the whole world.

Lent begins on Wednesday, February 22nd, with our annual Ash Wednesday Service at 6 PM. We hope you can join us! Lent is our time as a community to prepare our hearts over a 40-day period (plus Sundays) to welcome the gift of the resurrection of Jesus on Easter. Lent is a time to deepen our spiritual formation as we reflect on our own relationship with Jesus and our calling as ministers for Christ in our world. This Lenten season we will grow in Christ as we learn more about the wisdom of the Celtic Christian tradition through our Lenten sermon series. May the Holy Trinity open our hearts to receive new inspiration from Celtic Christianity this Lenten Season.




Please keep Bob and Mary Andrews in your prayers. Mary has recently had surgery to remove a blood clot and needs prayers for healing and comfort.

January 10th we had a productive session meeting celebrating Susan King and Ciaran Hynes joining session in 2023, our new screen, projector, and microphones in the sanctuary, progress on the Peace Garden, and God's grace, mercy, and love in our 9:00 am Adult Spiritual Formation Classes on Sunday mornings.

Our financial status coming into the year was at -\$10,598. We ended the year with a positive balance of \$26,228, which is \$36,826 positive cash flow for the 2022 year. Our Capital Campaign finished at the end of December and the total will be celebrated at our Annual Meeting January 29th, immediately after the church service.

Our Fiscal Stability Committee met on December 20th. They recommended several items to Finance and Facilities and we will hear back on those topics in February. This completed the work of the committee, and it is now absolved. Our thanks go to all those members.

In 2022 we distributed 125 bicycles – the highest of any year. We all are so pleased that we are able to assist folks who come to Love INC in search of help to get back on their feet. It is heartwarming to hear how grateful they are! Thank you to Session and our congregation who support this Ministry!



Per capita is a set amount of money (apportionment) per member that congregations pay to the larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Ato Markos has been negotiating with local officials and a road-building crew to get big machines about 17 miles down the mountain to where a bridge was washed out in a huge storm last May. The communities needing clean water have been cut off. MDC can't get building supplies down until trucks can go again. Arrangements have been made now, and as soon as fuel is delivered, repairs will begin. (There are only about a dozen vehicles in the district, and no filling stations. Fuel is stored in barrels and siphoned out as needed.)


What is Lent?

Lent (meaning "springtime") is a period of 40 days (excluding Sundays) prior to Easter which the early church set aside as a time of preparation. It is a time of preparation of one's heart, mind, and soul, which allows one to fully embrace, experience, and live into the depth of the Paschal mystery that is presented to us in Christ's death and resurrection. It is a time in which we are called, in continuity with other Christians throughout the ages, to pray, repent, fast, listen, refocus, and remember.

During this season, we pray for grace, grace to see ourselves as we truly are. We pray for strength, strength not only to see our desperate, limited, and often desolate humanness, but also for the strength to see God as He truly is, with arms open wide, waiting to refresh us with hope, compassion, and peace. We pray that the Spirit of the living God will empower us in fresh, new ways as we seek to serve, to learn, to live, and to love. We repent of the times that we have fallen short, of the moments when we have not been kind, when we have not lived justly, when we have been selfish and fearful, when we were not present to the people around us.

During this season, we choose to fast, sacrificing our own desires, wants, and needs, in order that we may be resensitized to the needs of the world around us, to the cries for love and the cries for justice. We set aside our own incessant cravings that we may hear the ever-present still, small voice of God speaking to us in the midst of a world filled with noise, with busyness, with "doing," with mindlessness. We fast in order that we may hear again, that we may recognize our own longings for life, for healing, for love, that we may live mindfully in the present, truly seeing one another as sons and daughters of God.

And, finally, during this season we remember. We remember that we are but dust, that we were created from dust and to dust we shall return. We remember that we were bought with a price, that we are not our own, and that we are deeply, deeply loved in the midst of our brokenness, in the midst of our shortcomings, in the midst of our failings, and in the midst of our weakness. We are reminded that God is ever present, never changing and that we are forever held by His great mercy. Lent is a time of prayer, repentance, fasting, remembering, and celebrating what and whose we are. During this Lenten season, may you experience God's gracious and loving presence as you wait in expectation for the day when, by His Spirit, all is made new.
