The Joy of the Incarnation

Christmas is a season of joy as we remember the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ. I treasure the opportunity each year for our church community to remember the stories surrounding the birth of Jesus. As Christians, our two major holidays are the birth of Jesus and the resurrection of Jesus. The birth reminds us of the gift of the incarnation, God becoming one of us as a human being. Easter reminds us of the resurrection and the gift of eternal life.

Why is the incarnation a reason for joy? God becoming one of us in Jesus shows that our God is not aloof to the suffering in the world. Instead, in Jesus we remember that God understands the highs and lows of the human experience. Jesus has experienced what we experience daily. Jesus is God with skin on.

Jesus shows us that God is love in his demonstration of love to the most vulnerable. Jesus faced the perils of being born under the hardship of having no room in the inn. His parents struggled with the reputation of having Mary's pregnancy occur before wedlock. Jesus and his parents became refugees who fled to Egypt to protect his life.

As we reflect on the struggles of life and the perils in the world, we can find comfort in knowing that God understands and sent his Son to

There is a drug addiction epidemic in our valley, although it is unfortunately not unique to our area.

Drugs, especially opioids like fentanyl and heroin, have stretched out their deadly tentacles and have a suffocating grip on so many people. And because of the voracious appetite of the monster of addiction, people who are in its grasp sometimes sacrifice everything on the altar of acquiring more drugs.

"Getting well" is what it's called, because when someone is addicted, if they are not high, they are very sick. Their body and brain are screaming out for more drugs to relieve the pain. They burn bridges, destroy relationships, hurt people, and commit crimes. All this compounded with the addiction itself leaves people isolated in shame. Addiction leads to shame, and shame mixed with addiction is deadly, because shame is something that isolates people in their addiction. They don't believe they are worthy to be included. It is a horrible cycle.

We have had many memorials here at Tierra Nueva for people who died as a result of drug overdose. Several of the memorials were for people who were at one time a part of Tierra Nueva. They were struggling to regain their lives after addiction had ravaged them. They were invited to the table, loved and included.

If only our love could hold them back from relapse.

Despite all the efforts, the addiction pulled them back, and shame kept them isolated. Then they breathed their last breath, and the hearts of their loved ones shattered into silent tears cried alone.

Some of the memorials were for people we had never met, but their family had heard that we were a safe place where they could remember their loved one without judgment or shame.

The thing about the shame that surrounds addiction is that it doesn't stop with the person who is addicted. It carries over to their loved ones. To lose a child or loved one is heart wrenching. To lose a loved one to overdose carries the excruciating heartache of loss with a suffocating shadow of shame hanging over the survivors.

Shame has even kept families from celebrating the life of the dear one who died. You see, when someone is suffering with addiction, sometimes people find it hard to remember the person who is worthy of being celebrated. It doesn't feel like a celebration of life when that life was so broken that they damaged the people around them.

Several families waited a long time to have a memorial. They wanted to remember the person, not the addiction. But addiction was the reason they were gone. See how complicated it is?

Many came to us when they found out that we would host a memorial for their loved one. We walked alongside them throughout the process, invited and included them at the table of remembrance, this time for their dearly departed.

Tierra Neva is a safe place for families of those who have lost loved ones through overdose to come together to remember, grieve, and be loved right where they are. Shame must stay out.

There is no shame in celebrating a life. There is grief and sorrow, especially when that life is cut short, but there is love and healing in coming together in remembrance.

We will not stop praying, inviting, including, and believing that dear ones will be pulled back from addiction and death and will achieve a life of sobriety. We will not give up. It is worth the fight. So many of our people have conquered addiction and are fully living. They are reaching out and sharing the hope and strength they have found in Jesus. Hope is not lost.

We hope and pray that one day we will no longer have to officiate and host memorials for people whose lives have been cut short. But until that day comes, we will be sitting across from mothers who sob as they tell us about their child, and they ask if we can remember them for who they were, and not for what they did. And we do. And we will.

That is what Jesus does when He invites us to the table to remember him. He invites us for who we are, not what we have done. Tierra Nueva is a place of remembrance. Every week we gather in a circle for communion to remember the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus. We feel the weight of Him dying and rejoice in the resurrection life that conquers death.

We also remember the people who have died tragically, and we welcome survivors of loss and survivors of addiction to the table, regardless of who they are, where they have come from, or how they have been living their lives. God invites us here just as we are. We will remember together.

Luke 22:19 He took some bread and gave thanks to God for it. Then he broke it in pieces and gave it to the disciples, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

20 After supper he took another cup of wine and said, "This cup is the new covenant between God and his people—an agreement confirmed with my blood, which is poured out as a sacrifice for you." [h]


