The Season of Lent is coming earlier than usual this year. We will celebrate Ash Wednesday on Valentine's Day, February 14th. It is a little ironic that on the day of love, we will also humbly remember the fragility of life. Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent, reminds us that "from dust we come and to dust we shall return." Interestingly, what makes love so precious, is that we experience and pursue love while recognizing the vulnerability of our lives? Love feels risky in a world that is so fragile and yet love is what life is really all about.

During this Lenten Season, my sermons will be based on John Philip Newell's book, The Rebirthing of God. We will once again spend Lent reflecting on the wisdom of Celtic Christianity. Celtic Christianity reminds us that at the heart of God and all of creation is the gift of love.

I know some people say that love is a lofty word that is used so lightly that is has lost some of its meaning, but for me love remains an exciting word that characterizes the heart of God for you and me. Just as Valentine's Day may be a day that honors love in many forms, so Lent is a church season that invites us to experience God's love in all of its fullness.

I hope this Lent is a time when we can all fall in love with God in a fresh way. As we explore John

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
# Love and Light

Philip Newell's insights from his book, we will be invited to explore spiritual practices that are contemplative in nature. When a heart falls in love with God it is natural to see the world through the lens of light. Remember the words from the beginning of the Gospel of John.

1 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. 2 He was in the beginning with God. 3 All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being 4 in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. 5 The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it.

During this Lenten Season, may be embrace God's love and see the light of Christ in one another and the world around us.

# Pioneering toward Every

As we train leaders we are always reminding ourselves of both the importance of who we are (identity in Christ) and why we do what we do (mission) toward AIA's vision in the Great Commission: Building movements (multiplying disciples) so that everyone knows someone who truly follows Jesus on every team, in every sport, in every nation. "Every" points to the scope of the mission only God can reach.

"It has always been my ambition to preach the gospel where Christ was not known, so that I would not be building on someone else's foundation. Rather, as it is written: 'Those who were not told about him will see, and those who have not heard will understand."" (Rom. 15:20-21)

AIA has identified three metro areas where we do not have athletic movements : New York City, Kansas City, and Salt Lake City. This week, we have staff in NY and KS pioneering work meeting campus ministers, athletes, coaches, church and community leaders who could potentially help launch movements.

- Pray for Lee and Kelsey Grander, who are a part of the scouting team in NY. (Lee is in Maureen's team leader coaching group.)
- Biggest prayer request: if the Lord wants them to lead and recruit a team for NY, it would be a clear "yes" for Kelsey

Dear Partners,

Happy New Year to you all! We trust your Christmas was marked by joy in the Gift of Christ to the world. Joy to the world, the Lord is come Here are some updates:

We enjoyed a rather calm Christmas break here in Los Angeles with Brian's side of the family. But Julie's side up in Oregon has just come through some dicey weather and exciting stories of large falling trees, treacherous but beautiful coatings of ice everywhere, lengthy power outages with accompanying frigid indoor temperatures in the sub-freezing storm, and frozen plumbing adventures. They are now safe and warm, for which we are all thankful. Other friends of ours in Portland had large heavy trees fall on their houses, so they are facing longer-term consequences. Please pray for them. And may we be thankful for the roofs over our heads we so often take for granted.

Julie had the third ultrasound on her leg Monday, and unfortunately the blood clot is still there. Please pray for it to fully dissolve. In better news, Julie has been doing physical therapy for her injured knee, and she is making good progress.

- Genesis is still out for field testing.
- Brian is working steadily on exegeting Exodus and John with the respective translators.
- Psalms is nearly all drafted, and Brian has begun initial glossing into English in preparation for exegesis.
- The Gospel of Mark is now back translated into Russian and currently the consultant is looking over everything. Then the consultant and the translator and Brian will meet and go through the whole book together looking for any places that could be improved. We answer any questions the consultant may have about each passage. We expect to do that final consultant check of Mark in March, and then it should be ready for publication (which has its own stages to go through.)

We have asked for prayer for an increase in partners in our translation work and ministry. We still desire to have more individuals and church groups like you, praying for and undergirding our project and the Abaza people with faithful commitment as you do. As to recent funding, though, we want to joyfully report that in December the Lord provided funds to cover our budget last year! Thank you to all who were part of that huge answer to prayer; praise our faithful God with us for meeting that need!

Thank you for your prayers and support as we partner together for the Lord's work in getting His Good News of Jesus to the Abaza people in their language!




New Year's Eve game night! Food and fun...what a great start to the New Year!

As you know, the church will soon begin the season of Lent, the forty days (excluding Sundays) prior to Easter which the early church set aside as a time of preparation to center one's heart, mind, and spirit on the Paschal mystery. The church's choice of forty days is by no means a coincidence. Not only does the number forty remind us of Jesus's extended temptation in the desert, but it additionally intimates passages of significant Old Testament wilderness episodes, namely that of Moses (Ex. 24:18; 34:28), Elijah (I Kings 19:8), and the children of Israel. In Deuteronomy 8:2-3, as Moses prepares the Israelites to enter the land of Canaan, he admonishes the people to remember always that the Lord led them in the desert "to humble [them] and test [them] in order to know what is in [their] heart... [and] to teach [them] that [they] do not live by bread alone." Later in the chapter, he urges the Israelites to remember that their power and strength come from the Lord (Deut. 8:17-18).

In Jesus's quoting of the opening verses of Deuteronomy chapter 8, the reader learns of the broader biblical narrative surrounding Jesus's wilderness experience. Much as the Israelites wanderings took place prior to their entrance into Canaan, Jesus's testing took place prior to the beginning of his earthly ministry. The allusion to Moses's sermon indicates that Jesus too must be tested in order to demonstrate his ability to keep the Mosaic admonitions as a faithful follower of the Israelite tradition. Additionally, the connection between Jesus's desert experience and that of the Israelites serves to remind us that the power and strength for Christ's earthly ministry came from the same source upon which they relied. It empowered. was God who strengthened, and gave the children of Israel their ability to thrive once they entered the Promised Land. It is the same God who empowered and strengthened Christ, and it is the same God who empowers and strengthens us, leads us out of deserts and into positions and places in which we can thrive.

Moreover, much like the Israelites' wilderness experience, Jesus's time in the desert was not merely a spiritual testing. As Mark indicates in verse 13 of chapter one, we discover that Jesus was "with the wild animals," which, can be noted, were more prevalent in Jesus's day (including lions!) than they are now in Palestine. Thus, in verse 13 we encounter Jesus in the wilderness, tested by Satan, and vulnerable to danger of bodily harm. In any good film, such a scenario as this would be the precursor to highly dramatic scenes in which the protagonist fights for his or her life, yet, as we come to the end of verse 13, we stumble upon this small, seemingly innocuous, yet beautiful phrase "and the angels were ministering to him," (NASV) a phrase which appears to be somewhat of an afterthought.

In Scripture, the protecting and guiding presence of angels is revealed in numerous instances – II Kings 6:16 (Elisha and the army), Psalm 34:7 ("the angel of the Lord encamps around those who fear him"), Psalm 91:11 ("he will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways"), Daniel 3:28 (Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego in the fiery furnace), Daniel 6:22 (Daniel in the lion's den), Acts 12:6-11 (Peter

freed from prison), Heb. 11:33, and II Timothy 4:17 to name a few. When angels minister armies are re-routed, fire does no harm, the mouths of lions are closed. prison doors are opened, and those who fear the Lord are surrounded, guarded, and protected from harm. Suddenly those seven words do not seem so little or innocuous anymore! Though in the middle of the desert, surrounded by wild animals, and facing the prospect of physical harm, Jesus was cared for, ministered to, and protected by the angels. The wild animals could no more do harm to Jesus than the fire could burn Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, and no more than the lions could turn on Daniel in the lions' den. Though it appeared it might be the end for Jesus, the presence of angels infused hope, security, and peace into what was most certainly a perilous situation.

The Amplified Bible translation elaborates that "the angels ministered continually to [Jesus]." I have a feeling that many of us need to be ministered to continually by the angels during this Lenten season, a season during which we are afflicted by the wild animals of an ongoing pandemic, fear, uncertainty, anxiety, loneliness, chronic pain, illness, stress, boredom, hopelessness. and When angels minister, circumstances may not always change, but the mouths of wild animals are shut, perils are lifted, and we are enveloped in a cocoon of peace, comfort, hope, and safety. In this forty-day season of Lent, may you be ministered to by the angels. May you receive comfort, peace, protection, and hope. May you be guarded in all your ways. May you remember that it is God who empowers, God who strengthens, and God who gives you the ability to make it through each day!

The Newberg Peace Garden is always looking for volunteers to plant, water, weed, and give our garden the TLC it needs.


